## RUSGA Town Hall Meetings

RUSGA is developing a new program that seeks to collaborate with departments, administration, staff and faculty, and students to explore long lasting modes of transparency and communication. What this will look like is an open Town Hall meeting that students are welcome to attend in Walker's Pub from 4:30pm-6pm every other Thursday, with a specific focus on one invited department, admin, etc. Students can submit questions before the meeting to maintain a focus and time effective agenda which will be reviewed before the meeting. The first meeting was held on October 13 with it reoccurring every two weeks.

The focus of the first RUSGA Town Hall Meeting was with the Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusive Excellence and Student Senate to engage in thoughtful discussion surrounding anti-racism within the classroom and student concerns. Through this initial meeting, our objective is to provide clarification and effective action on how to advocate, protect, and enhance the student experience both inside and outside of the classroom when it comes to student diversity and equity.

My executive cabinet and I would like to invite you all to join us in this new program. We look forward to you being able to join us and advocate for a more student-centric and informed institute in the months to follow.

## Addressing Student Concerns

In light of recent student concerns and the community experience of disconnect, lack of safety, and the unheard voices of the student body, RUSGA is dedicated to creating a platform from which students may speak and come together to support one another. We would like to encourage students to reach out to us to have a conversation on how best we may support students and their needs.

In recognition of the work accomplished now, I have been working in tandem with Barbara Wilcots, Dave Law, Karen Riley, Cody Teets, and Administration to create a space for students to advocate their needs and foster a community of transparency and collaboration between students and the University. Understandably, the process is slow and frustrating, however I have been able to accomplish student outreach, networking, and welcoming more voices to the table.

Grecia has been collaborating with Nicki Gonzales and staff/Administration in helping to create the Friday student lead diversity dialogues (Good Trouble Dialogues), in which students are encouraged to facilitate thoughtful and considerate conversation on diversity, intersectionality, and how we may all strengthen our community. As well, she has also been collaborating with the Office of Diversity and other campus partners to coordinate a Dia de los Muertos celebration on Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> to bring the greater Regis community together in celebration and awareness of Hispanic Traditions.

Additionally, Iris has been leading the student Senate on University policy review, student advocacy and representation, and proving strength and connection with clubs and organizations. Iris has been able to accomplish a forum of student representation and advocacy, and has been able to begin work on amending University policy to provide for the support and well-being of all students at Regis.

In academics, Chantele has been developing conversation and spaces with Karen Riley to strengthen students' academic experiences and connect with faculty to better support the needs of students within the classroom.

Lastly, through fun and inclusive programs, Nelisse has worked to build a culture of inclusion, school spirit, and pride in our community, and has been collaborating with student athletics to show support for our Regis teams. As well, Nelisse has been working with Dave Law and the Programming Board to host events and support clubs and organizations on campus.

As a student group, RUSGA would like to offer solidarity and recognition of student's experiences both on and off campus and personally offer gratitude for the hard work that students Chekka Christilles and Michele To have offered the student body through the Victim Advocacy and Violence Prevention and Programming Board organizations. The detailed and hard work that both these two students have contributed in service of the student experience has been thoughtful, fun, and a resource for all of us here at Regis.
